

Community Connections Reaches Two Milestones in 2009!












Glen McNamee Scholarship

During the past two years, the Rams Club has awarded the Glen McNamee Scholarship to a deserving sophomore, junior and senior. While I try to explain each year how we arrive at the winners, it sometimes gets lost in translation and the excitement of the evening. This is important and hits right at the heart of what this program and this family is all about. So indulge me if you will, while I present the scholarship's background and process once again in the form of a FAQ. [I've always wanted to do an FAQ!]

How did the scholarship come about? Well, read the mission statement above. Now, as this mission statement has been turned into action and results, it's clear this coach has a plan and a vision we can align with as parents. He's sincere. And, some parents got together and said, "That's cool". No really, they said, "That's cool". These parents donated money to set up the scholarship in Glen's name to enable the march toward the vision. The premise that "it's more than just football" resonates through our club and the scholarship has been created to recognize this amazing approach to high school sports.

This scholarship is about a player's commitment and effort and results.

Who can win the scholarship? We provide one \$500 scholarship to a deserving sophomore, junior, and senior player each year.

Why not award a freshman scholarship? High school sports are tough. And the demands of a person's time and focus are critical to be successful. Add to that our commitment to excellence in ALL areas of contribution and service, and some will make different decisions. That's ok; not everyone can be a Marine either. Freshman year is the one many students figure this out, and some decide it's not their cup of tea. That's ok too. With the typical number of freshman making different decisions for their sporting lives, we believe its right to focus on those that stay with football.

What are the requirements to win the scholarship? There is a formula that was established that includes: grades, community service, leadership, discipline and attendance. The formula and process to reach the final recipients is objective in 95% of its measure. Grades = GPA. Community Service = Hours. Discipline issues = yes or no. Attendance = days or school/practice missed. And, leadership = who stands out among his peers. Leadership is the ONLY subjective measure; all others are math.

The data is entered into a spreadsheet and calculated. NO ONE knows who wins the scholarship before the banquet except: Me, the person working with the trophy dude, and the trophy dude.

When is the scholarship provided? The funds are held by the Rams Club until the student's senior year at which time a check is presented at the banquet.

What happens if a player stops playing football? If a player leaves the team mid-season, he is not eligible that year. If a prior winner leaves football any time after that winning year, the scholarship is held until their senior year. I think that covers all the main points. If you have some questions, please write and let me know.

I'll also take the opportunity now to congratulate again this year's recipients; Sam Adams, TJ Zimmerman, and Kris Weikel!!

This season I saw a group of young men form a team and if you listen to them for a minute or two, they call it a family. This family came together to surprise everyone at the beginning of the season, take two hard losses, then refocus and rally to win-out. They did it by looking in and seeing the strength in each other. You could hear this in their words and deeds. Every interview they gave to an outside party talked of team, focus, respect and love for each other. The losses? They blamed on themselves and took to heart getting better. Isn't this what we wanted them to learn?

The first CV game the team was picked to lose, but they showed the strength of character and patience and confidence of true winners. The second CV game, they were picked to lose again. There were a dozen points in that game a lesser team would have given up. Not these guys and girls. Every person wearing green that night was on their feet and believed: players, coaches, trainers, managers...... every one of them believed. This belief carried them to within inches of a different outcome. Isn't that what we wanted them to learn?

During the game, mistakes were made and luck didn't seem to go their way at times. Give up? They kept working, harder and harder. Some players who had limited roles earlier in the season rose to the levels they themselves may not have thought possible. They were there when the team needed them as if to say, "Brothers, I got this one." The chain was strained but never broke. Isn't that what we wanted them to learn?

After the game the score said our season was over. I was blessed enough to be there and see it all. I saw the last handshake. I saw the Rams Pride circle and heard the family yell out. I saw the last Alma Mater and salute. The tears flowed. Hugs. They weren't ready for this to end. They reassured each other that the score was their result, not the fault or blame of any one person or side of the ball. The score brought them closer together. The seniors realized their journey was over. The underclassmen picked up the flag and now hold it tightly. This all happened there, on that field Friday night. Isn't that was we wanted them to learn?

So you see, life is a matter of perspective. As a dad, as a believer in Coach's Vision, and as a former Ram, I chose to see Friday night as a win. The only downside that night was the score. In the end, our team, our young family gets it.

And, golly, isn't that what we wanted them to learn?

Halfway through the first quarter a friend of mine showed up a bit late and brought a mess of Cheerleader Cookies he bought at the gate. He offered them to our little group of fans. I said NO! I don't eat cookies during the game; I only eat cookies after we win.

As the clock hit zero we all stood and applauded our team as we should have. We all said our goodbyes and a few of us stayed to complete our journey. It didn't hit me at the time but, Mike left and he took the cookies! In my mind Friday night, this season, was as big a win as I've ever been part of.

"This is one of the toughest thing I've ever had to deal with during my entire high school career," said quarterback Lewis Correale after Friday night's 24 – 21 defeat to Cumberland Valley. "As the season moved on, we became more than just a team, more than just Rams. We became a family, and it's hard to walk away from that, especially when it ends like this."

This could basically sum up the feelings of the entire team Friday night, as not a single dry eye was left as the team came off the field. Young men that were at one minute fighting fiercely and holding on to the hope of a win were the next minute brought to their knees, hugging their teammates and almost refusing to believe that the season could really be over as quickly as this.

"I love them. They are my family," said defensive lineman Robert Brooks as he walked out of the locker room. "I'm never going to forget them for the rest of my life, and that is all I have to say."





After a slow start in the game, Central Dauphin began to rally during the fourth quarter when wide receiver Jon Schnaars made an incredible catch, setting Kyle Wolfe up for a touchdown in the very next play. After that, things really started to turn around for us.

Gary Flythe basically pump faked a guy on Cumberland Valley to fall flat on his back, making the sidelines erupt with laughter. A crowd that spent most of the night shouting our shortcomings began to cheer us on as though they had believed in us the whole time.

As Steve Brandes said, "We got our mojo back!" Then Jon Schnaars caught a direct pass from Correale in the end zone. Deciding to attempt a two point conversion, Matt Heilig caught another perfect pass from Correale to bring the score to 21 – 24 with 7:52 left.

We weren't winning, but we were close enough to make them nervous.

When CD got the ball back to the 23 yard line with 9 seconds left, we went for a field goal to hopefully tie up the score and take the game into overtime. However, it just wasn't meant to be as the ball missed the field goal by mere inches.

"Cumberland Valley was stunned that we had made it that far," said Brandes "We were jumping up and down on the sideline, and everything was on our side. The missed field goal was the difference, but Fakete gave an effort. And I will say right now that that was an incredible effort from him."

"We rallied back, but it wasn't enough," said Brooks.

"It was a great game," said linebacker AJ Sweigard. "I just want to let my team know that I love you guys, and I'm going to play harder for you next year."





Maybe what makes this game so much harder to walk away from than the others is how close it was in the final seconds. Maybe it is because some of these guys may never put on a football uniform again. Maybe – this being more difficult to handle than others – is that the seniors are finally realizing that everything is coming to an end and that this is just the beginning. Or maybe it is the bond that Coach McNamee has worked so hard to form in his teams, and that he has actually instilled more stronger this year than ever before. Either way, the lessons they have learned here will stay with them forever.

"This is one chapter of my life that I am never going to forget," said Correale. "I will always have my boys, and I know that no matter what happens they will always have my back as I will always have theirs. I love them, and it's just been a great experience working with them."

Watching the guys that he has tried to inspire all season long with tears in their eyes, Brandes said, "One thing that I keep looking forward to is that someday, I'll be watching a few of these guys playing football at the college level on television. That is what makes me really proud. I will know that for some short period of time, I was working with these guys and we were all on the same team."

"This is a very collective and supportive team," he continued. "They have a great team spirit and I'm very proud of how far they have come."

Putting the night's game in perspective of how much farther they have to go in the playoffs, Lewis Correale said, "It's really given us a boost. At the same time, we still have room to get better – we need to get better because next week we are playing a tough team, and the games aren't going to be getting any easier."







On the other hand, Robert Brooks compares the night's game to annihilate peoples' dreams. "At the end of the first half, the score gave them hope. We had to crush their hope of winning the game. After that, it really began to pick up."

As is usually with this team, the game was barely over when their thoughts were turned to next week's game, when they will once again face Cumberland Valley.

"We're still dancing," said Coach McNamee at the end of the game as his team gathered around to listen. "But we have to prepare like champions, because guess who we're facing next week? And they have already started talking about it, too."

However, they do have one last thing to say about the night's game: We balled out. I've tried mentioning to them that this isn't grammatically correct English – or understandable English for that matter - but who really wants to anger a football player after a big game?



The Four Diamonds Bowl, a football game pitting the top two earning high schools in the area was held this past Friday. Central Dauphin played Lower Dauphin at Hersheypark Stadium, and throughout the night there were several different opportunities to donate to the fund.

During half time, for example, students from both schools as well as local celebrities were challenged to kick as many field goals as they could in under a minute in Kicks for Four Diamonds. While Lower Dauphin won that game, they weren't so lucky in football. Central Dauphin won with a final score of 31 - 14.

"At half time, we had a big turn around," explains defensive lineman Robert Brooks. "We stayed confident, came back into the game and stomped on them."

Wide receiver Trei Gilchrist agreed. "We came back with strong momentum. Going into half time we were winning 14 - 7, but we felt that we could have been doing a lot better."

One play that added only added to the energy was made by Kris Weikel late in the fourth quarter. Lower Dauphin had the ball at the 32 yard line. After the quarter back fumbled the ball, Weikekrecovered and ran it in for a touch down before the other side even had a chance to realize that the ball had switched possession.



Fakete's performance only serves to make the rest of the team look better, giving them a seamless transition from special teams to offense and defense.

"Our defense held it down, they did what they needed to do. Our offense pushed themselves exactly when it was needed to make the plays," explained linebacker Kemji Rajis. "There really isn't one or two stand out plays of the night because the whole team works so well together.

"We're just a tough team. No one can out-physical us because we are a really physically strong team. That is what gets us through all of our games."

At the end of the night, everyone on the CD side was pleased with their efforts. That, and the fact that the Four Diamonds trophy will be coming back to Central Dauphin until next years game. Until then, they are all just looking forward to and preparing for next week's game against Cumberland Valley

All of that aside, perhaps one of the strongest performances that night came from Sean Fakete, the team's kicker and punter. According to Coach Denny Duttenhoffer, the high school average for the hang time of a football after it has been punted is around 3 -3.5 seconds.

For Fakete, he averages slightly above that with the longest hang time of the night clocking in at 4.1 seconds. "That is college level stuff," said Coach Duttenhoffer.

Other members of the team have taken notice, commenting on his ability while he is on the field. "Sean makes it look easy. He goes out there and kicks like a champion, every time."


These are the favorites of Hunter Bentz, 8, and Cody Wells, 7, both of West Hanover.

I love that they can come down to these kids level and not try to out shine them, but to inspire them and motivate them."

Kris Weikel has been working with the white group, which is made up of third fourth and fifth graders. It is his first year helping out with the camp.

"I like seeing all the little kids running around, having fun, playing football, and learning to love it as much as we do," he said. "I also like seeing the future Central Dauphin Rams football players."

For his group, he said he wants the kids "to learn the basic while improving every day and reaching their potential."

As Coach McNamee said, "It's all about getting better. That's the name of the game, trying to get better and leave here a better player than when we arrive."
